He had none of the things a new-born babe would normally have. Hardly had He been born when the perilous flight through the desert began. For an infant the chances of survival were small.


A little Child in cradle lies,

Don't we feel this Christmas, perhaps more than ever, a longing to express our deepest thanks to the Child in the manger, who lies there as a sacrificial Lamb?


Beloved Child, how can I thank You? No sacrifice You deemed too great. You parted with Your Heavenly Father, Earth's night You entered for my sake.
